PROGRAM NOTES

Five Hebrew Love Songs – Eric Whitacre

In the spring of 1996, my great friend and brilliant violinist Friedemann Eichhorn invited me and my girlfriend-at-the-time Hila Plitmann (a soprano) to give a concert with him in his home city of Speyer, Germany. We had all met that year as students at the Juilliard School, and were inseparable.

Because we were appearing as a band of traveling musicians, 'Friedy' asked me to write a set of troubadour songs for piano, violin and soprano. I asked Hila (who was born and raised in Jerusalem) to write me a few 'postcards' in her native tongue, and a few days later she presented me with these exquisite and delicate Hebrew poems. I set them while we vacationed in a small skiing village in the Swiss Alps, and we performed them for the first time a week later in Speyer.

In 2001, the University of Miami commissioned me to adapt the songs for SATB chorus and string quartet, and the Efroni Choir in Israel commissioned me to adapt them for SA, violin and piano, leaving me now with five (!) different versions of the same work: SATB and string quartet; SATB, violin, and piano; SA and string quartet; SA violin, and piano; and the original soprano, violin, and piano. The choral parts are exactly the same for the different accompaniments, so that if the choir wants to perform the version with string quartet, the chorus can sing from the piano/violin score and the conductor can lead from the quartet version.

Each of the songs captures a moment that Hila and I shared together. **Kalá Kallá** (which means 'light bride') was a pun I came up with while she was first teaching me Hebrew. The bells at the beginning of **Éyze Shéleg!** are the exact pitches that awakened us each morning in Germany as they rang from a nearby cathedral.

Fern Hill – John Corigliano

John Corigliano is an award-winning American composer and educator based in New York. Winner of the Pulitzer Prize and five Grammy Awards and an Oscar, his music has been performed around the world. Best known for his sound-track for *The Red Violin* and for his groundbreaking opera, *The Ghosts of Versailles*, his music has been called "powerful" and "evocative." Upon discovering Dylan Thomas's poem, *Fern Hill* during his last year in college, Corigliano composed *Fern Hill* for mezzo-soprano, chorus, strings, harp, and piano in 1960 to match the poet's wistful childhood memories of his Aunt's farm in Wales. Though Corigliano included the directions "with simplicity" in the score, he later acknowledged that the poem and subsequent music had moments of darkness and struggle as well. The composer later created

versions for full orchestra and chamber orchestra. In 1976 he incorporated the piece into his larger symphonic work *A Dylan Thomas Trilogy*. The Adelphians perform the original 1960 version this afternoon.

CONDUCTORS

STEVEN ZOPFI is director of choral activities and professor of music at University of Puget, where he oversees four choirs, teaches conducting and applied voice, and conducts the award-winning Adelphian Concert Choir. Prior to his appointment at Puget Sound, he served on the faculties of Penn State University, the University of Washington, and Pacific Lutheran University. Choirs under his direction have been invited to sing at the local and regional conventions of the American Choral Director's Association, the National Association for Music Education, the Society of Composers Inc., the Colorado Early Music Society, and other professional organizations.

A native of New Jersey, Zopfi has a bachelor's degree in music education from the Hartt School of Music, a master's degree in conducting from the University of California, Irvine, and a doctor of musical arts degree in choral conducting from the University of Colorado. He taught in public schools in Vermont and New York, where he also served as Vermont State President of the American Choral Directors Association and as an executive board member of the Vermont Music Educators Association. Since coming to the Pacific Northwest in 2001, he has remained active in professional organizations, serving as Chair of Collegiate Activities for WA ACDA and NW ACDA. He is in constant demand as a conductor, adjudicator, and clinician. In 2015 he was named the Outstanding Choral Conductor of the year by WA ACDA

Zopfi served as the artistic director and conductor of the Portland Symphonic Choir from 2003–2018, the official chorus of the Oregon Symphony Orchestra. Zopfi led the Oregon Symphony in performances of Mozart's Mass in C Minor, Stravinsky's Symphony of Psalms, and music by Beethoven, Bach, and Wagner. Critics have hailed his work as "magical" and "superb." Zopfi has prepared choruses for Carlos Kalmar, Bernard Labadie, Alastair Willis, Murray Sidlin, Jean Marie Zeitouni, and Peter Schickele. As a singer, he has sung for many leading conductors including Robert Shaw and Sir David Wilcocks. He has performed with the Prague Philharmonic, the Colorado Symphony, the New Jersey Symphony, and the Pazardzhik Symphony; and is the founder and past artistic director of the Foundling Hospital Singers, the Boulder Schola Cantorum, the Grace Chamber Orchestra, and the Portland Sinfonietta.

JUDITH HERRINGTON brings more than 35 years of teaching and conducting experience to her work at Tacoma Youth Chorus and Charles Wright Academy in Tacoma, Washington, where she received the Inspirational Faculty Award and the Murray Foundation Chair for Teaching

Excellence. A graduate of the University of Oregon, Ms. Herrington earned her Master of Education degree from Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon. She has furthered her conducting studies through master classes with Rodney Eichenberger and Henry Leck. She has served on the Washington American Choral Directors Association Board as R&S Chair for Children's Choirs, President and Past-President of the Board and is the 2011 recipient of its Leadership and Service Award. She is an inaugural member of the School of Arts and Communication Advisory Board at Pacific Lutheran University.

Judith Herrington is the Founder and Artistic Director of the highly acclaimed Tacoma Youth Chorus, a choral education program of seven select choirs, grades 1 through 12, serving more than 240 young people in the south Puget Sound region of Washington since 1991. The chorus is recognized throughout the Northwest-Puget Sound area for their performance of outstanding music literature, superb musicianship and collaborations with professional performing organizations. Under Ms. Herrington's direction, the Chorus has performed for National Orff-Schulwerk Conventions, Northwest MENC convention and the Northwest ACDA conventions (1998, 2002, 2006, 2010, 2014). The Chorus has performed internationally as well, with cathedral tours in France, Eastern Europe and in Britain, Wales, and Ireland. Ms. Herrington is highly regarded as a quest conductor, workshop and choral clinician. Most recently, Ms. Herrington has conducted all-state and regional honor choirs and festivals in Idaho, Texas, Oregon, Washington, California, Hawaii, Montana, Wyoming, Pennsylvania, Alaska, Tennessee and Tokyo. She served as visiting faculty for graduate coursework at VanderCook College of Music. A noted composer and arranger, she has published choral compositions, arrangements and co-authored choral teaching texts through Pavane Publishing, Hal Leonard Publishing, and Colla Voce Publishing. She also edits a choral series for Pavane Publishing.

ABE GOLDING '20, MAT '22 completed a Bachelor of Music in Music Education degree from the University of Puget Sound in spring 2020, and has returned to pursue a Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) degree and a Washington State residency certificate in K-12 music education. In addition to his current appointment as assistant conductor of the Adelphian Concert Choir, Abe student-teaches K-5 general music full-time at Edison Elementary in Tacoma Public Schools. This coming year, Abe has been hired to teach K-5

general music at Bonney Lake Elementary in the Sumner-Bonney Lake School District.

GUEST PERFORMER

DAWN PADULA, mezzo-soprano, is a versatile performer of opera, oratorio, musical theatre, jazz, and classical concert repertoire. Opera roles include Carmen in Carmen, Azucena in Il Trovatore, Loma Williams in Cold Sassy Tree, Lady Jane in Patience (2018 Gregory Awards People's Choice Nominee), Lady Blanche in Princess Ida, Ruth in The Pirates of Penzance, Lady Blanche in Cherubino in Le Nozze di Figaro, Meg in Falstaff, The Third Lady in The Magic Flute, the Witch in Hansel and Gretel, Maddalena in Rigoletto, Isabella in The Italian Girl in Algiers, Erika in Vanessa, and the Sorceress in *Dido and Aeneas*. She recently recorded the roles of Zita in Gianni Schicchi and Olga Olsen in Street Scene with the Social Distance Opera. Recent engagements include the role of the Queen of the Fairies in Iolanthe (Tacoma Opera), and Dame Quickly in Falstaff (Puget Sound Concert Opera). Notable classical concert work includes performing as a soloist in a concert version of West Side Story with the Tacoma Symphony, being the mezzo-soprano soloist in Penderecki's Credo with the Houston Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Jahia Ling, and touring to Varna and Sofia, Bulgaria as the mezzo-soprano soloist in Mozart's Requiem with members of the Adelphian Concert Choir, the Portland Symphonic Choir, the Tuscon Masterworks Chorale, the West Liberty University Singers, the West Liberty College Community Chorus, and the Pazardzhik Symphony. Her musical theatre roles include paying tribute to celebrities in *Forbidden* Broadway's Greatest Hits, Jack's Mother in Sondheim's Into the Woods, Domina in Sondheim's A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, and Woman 3 in the Kander and Ebb revue. And the World Goes 'Round. She has also performed as a jazz vocalist in venues such as Pacific Lutheran University's Jazz Under the Stars Series and the Puget Sound Jacobsen Series.

In the Pacific Northwest, she has performed as a principal artist with Seattle Gilbert & Sullivan Society, Tacoma Opera, Kitsap Opera, Puget Sound Concert Opera, Concert Opera of Seattle, the Tacoma Concert Band, the Oregon Symphony, the Portland Symphonic Choir, the Seattle Bach Choir, and Opera Pacifica. She has also performed with Seattle Opera as a member

of the Supplementary Chorus, and has given solo recitals for the Second City Chamber Series and the Classical Tuesdays in Old Town Tacoma Concert Series. Her classical solo album, *Gracious Moonlight*, is available on streaming platforms.

Her research on training the tenor and baritone singing voice from the mezzo-soprano voice teacher perspective has been presented at the International Voice Foundation Symposium in Philadelphia, Penn., at the National Association of Teachers of Singing National Conference in Nashville, Tenn., and at the Art and Science of the Performing Voice Symposium in Seattle, Wash. Dr. Padula is currently Professor of Voice and Director of Vocal Studies at the University of Puget Sound School of Music, where she is the Chair of the Vocal Studies Area, directs the Opera Theater, and teaches Applied Voice, Diction for Singers, Vocal Pedagogy, and Vocal Techniques. In 2020, Dr. Padula was honored to receive Puget Sound's Tom A. Davis Teaching Award. She holds a Doctorate of Musical Arts from the University of Houston Moores School of Music with a minor concentration in vocal pedagogy and voice science, and a Masters of Music degree from the Manhattan School of Music in New York City.

PIANISTS

JIEUN YUN serves as a staff pianist for the University of Puget Sound School of Music in the choral area. She earned her doctorate at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary where she has also served as an adjunct faculty member. Dr. Yun currently serves as Organist for First Baptist Church in Tacoma and as a rehearsal pianist for Tacoma Youth Chorus. She has been seen as a collaborative pianist with the Orchestral Recital Series

JINSHIL YI '14 is an avid collaborative pianist in high demand throughout the Tacoma/Seattle area. She has appeared in concerts with Northwest Sinfonietta Artistic Partner David Lockington, soprano Christina Kowalski, mezzo-soprano Dawn Padula, and baritone Ryan Bede. Since 2016, Jinshil has served as staff accompanist at the University of Puget Sound, working extensively with Steven Zopfi, Kathryn Lehmann, and Ed Hughes on the acclaimed Adelphian Concert Choir, Dorians, and Chorale.

A heartfelt sacred music enthusiast, Jinshil loves expressing her faith through her work as pianist and organist for two churches in Lakewood, Wash. In addition to being on staff as a pianist for Tacoma Youth Chorus and Charles Wright Academy, she regularly partners with other Tacoma schools, choirs, and private music studios for music festivals, competitions, and concerts. Both her solo and collaborative playing have been broadcast on the radio, most recently on 98.1 KING FM following a concert tour of western Washington. Jinshil serves as Managing Director for Second City Chamber Series and is a soprano in the Symphony Tacoma Voices.

Jinshil holds three undergraduate degrees cum laude from the University of Puget Sound in music, biochemistry, and politics and government with an international relations emphasis.
