BIOGRAPHIES

JENNIFER NELSON is currently the Principal Clarinetist with the Pacific Northwest Ballet and the Auburn Symphony Orchestras. She also has a very active freelance career, including playing extra clarinet and saxophone with the Seattle Symphony and Seattle Opera, Broadway-style shows at the Fifth Avenue and Paramount Theaters, and she also records for television, motion pictures, and video game scores. Ms. Nelson has also traveled throughout the United States with the national touring companies of "Phantom of the Opera" and New York City Opera. In addition to her stateside concerts, Ms. Nelson's orchestral and recital performances have also taken her to Mexico, Japan, Germany, Liechtenstein, Austria, Honduras, and most recently, India. Ms. Nelson received her BM Performance (Instrumental) from the University of Southern California, and completed some graduate work at Temple University.

FRANCINE PETERSON, Affiliate Artist, bassoonist, joined the School of Music Fall 2014 and is an active freelancer and teacher in the Puget Sound Area. She has performed as an extra player with Seattle symphony, Seattle Opera, 3rd and Contrabassoon with the Pacific NW Ballet, the auburn symphony, Principal Bassoon of NW Sinfonietta, 5th Ave. Theater, and various other venues. She teaches and performs at the Marrowstone Music Festival and she coaches for the Youth symphony and teaches for the Endangered Instrument Program, introducing endangered instruments to middle school students. Besides teaching at University of Puget Sound, she also teaches at Pacific Lutheran University. She is a member of the Camus Wind Quintet, a faculty wind quintet from Pacific Lutheran University. She maintains a large private studio.

WENDY WILHELMI is active as a teacher and performer throughout the Pacific Northwest, frequently playing with some of the region's finest ensembles, including Seattle Symphony, Seattle Opera, Northwest Sinfonietta and Pacific Northwest Ballet Orchestra. For two seasons, Ms. Wilhelmi served as assistant principal flute and piccolo of the Vancouver (BC) Symphony and prior to that engagement was a regular member of the Spokane Symphony for 10 years. Ms. Wilhelmi received her Bachelor of Music in music history *magna cum laude* from the University of Washington, and her Master of Music in flute performance from Northwestern University where she studied with Walfrid Kujala. She was principal flute of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago and co-principal flute of the Philarmonica de Queretaro (Mexico) prior to returning to her native Northwest. In 1998 Ms. Wilhelmi won first place in the National Flute Association's Piccolo Artist Competition. When not playing or teaching the flute, she can be found

studying romance languages, running, hiking, biking or helping out in her family's winery and tasting room in Seattle.

RODGER BURNETT received his Master of Music from the University of Washington. He currently plays the principal horn with the Pacific Northwest Ballet and the Northwest Chamber Orchestra. Mr. Burnett has played with the Seattle Symphony and the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra, and plays regularly with the Seattle Opera.

DAN WILLIAMS is one of Seattle's most sought-after performers, as soloist, orchestral musician, teacher and recording artist. He is principal oboist of the Pacific Northwest Ballet Orchestra and has served as principal oboist of the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra. He held the same positions in the Harrisburg (PA) and Binghamton (NY) Symphonies. He also has played principal oboe with the Seattle Symphony and the Seattle Opera.

Of his 1996 performance of Bach's Double Concerto with Joseph Silverstein and the Northwest Chamber Orchestra, the Seattle Times reported that "oboist Dan Williams poured out waves of beautiful tone with considerable musicality." In a 1999 review of the Vaughan-Williams Oboe concerto, the Bellingham Herald described Williams as "a consummate player, in easy command of those subtle shades of color and phrase that can let the oboe approach the expressive range of the human voice. It was a performance to melt your heart."

Mr. Williams currently teaches oboe at the University of Puget Sound, and has served on the faculties of Western Washington University and the University of Washington School of Music.

A native of Seattle, Williams received his musical training at the Juilliard School and at Western Washington University, where he was voted most Outstanding Graduate by the music faculty.
