
SCHOOL OF MUSIC JACOBSEN PROFESSIONAL ARTIST SERIES 2024-25

TINA A. HUYNH is Assistant Professor and Chair of Music Education at the University of Puget Sound.

JEFFERY N. LUND, Affiliate Artist at the University of Puget Sound, teaches percussion and is an instructor in the Community Music department.

SARAH BEACOCK '26 is a percussionist from Vancouver, Wash., pursuing a degree in business with a minor in applied music, and is involved in the Percussion Ensemble, Wind Ensemble, and Jazz Orchestra at Puget Sound.

ALEX ADAMS '14, Affiliate Artist, studied with Dr. Dawn Padula at Puget Sound where he majored in vocal performance. He currently teaches voice and opera theatre, and is an instructor in the Community Music department.

JESSICA HALL, Affiliate Artist, has been at the University of Puget Sound since January 2022, working as a collaborative pianist within the vocal department.

MARIA SAMPEN, violin, is Professor of Violin and Chair of the Strings Department at the University of Puget Sound, and teaches in the Community Music department.

DON KIRKPATRICK, violin, studied violin with Edward Seferian beginning at age 12, and continued taking lessons whenever possible until Mr. Seferian died in 2003. He subsequently has studied with Maria Sampen and currently with the Colorado Symphony Concertmaster, Yumi Hwang-Williams. He is an Associate Professor of Clinical Practice at the University of Colorado and the Interim Chief of Gastroenterology/Hepatology at Denver Health, Colorado's Safety Net Hospital.

HARLAN ZHAO, violin, is a passionate young violinist studying with Dr. Maria Sampen for four years. He is a student in the Community Music department at the University of Puget Sound. He started violin lessons at age 5. He is currently a fifth grader at Charles Wright Academy. Harlan was the concerto competition winner of TYSA as the spring concert soloist in 2024. Outside of violin, Harlan enjoys swimming, tennis, and cooking with his parents.

KRISTEN MURPHY '88 is Director of Community Music and a flute instructor in the Community Music department.

ROBERT HUTCHINSON is Professor of Music Theory and Composition, and is Co-Director of Songwriting at the University of Puget Sound.
