BIOGRAPHIES

STORM BENJAMIN holds a bachelor's degree in percussion performance from Central Washington University and master's degree from Central Michigan University. While attending university, he toured nationally with the Oregon Crusaders Drum and Bugle Corp, and performed in two years with the Oregon Crusaders Indoor Drumline. Benjamin is the director of Seattle Percussion Works, a small percussion school located in the Ballard neighborhood of Seattle, Wash.

As a performer, he has been featured as a contemporary percussion soloist across Seattle. His performances have included symphony orchestras, chamber orchestras, percussion ensembles, and opera companies. He also composes and performs with his collaborative, percussion-centered ensemble AGAIN, the alt-pop band Terra Nobody, and the collective percussion ensemble Splinter Percussion.

JAMES W. DOYLE is a percussionist and teaching artist based in the Pacific Northwest. As a soloist and collaborator, he has performed throughout North America, Europe, Australia, Africa, and Asia, with recent appearances on the Seattle Symphony's octave9 Series, the Nakanojo Biennale, and residencies at Gunma University in Maebashi, Japan.

Before relocating to Washington, Doyle served as professor of music at Adams State University and earned a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. Prior to his tenure in academia, he was principal percussionist with the United States Air Force Band of the Golden West.

Doyle is on the administrative team of the Tacoma Youth Symphony Association and is the director of TYSAmba. He tours internationally with the U.S./Japan-based ensemble, Apricity Trio, and regularly performs with orchestras, opera companies, and chamber ensembles throughout the region. JEFFERY N. LUND a native of the Pacific Northwest, is a performer, educator, and conductor based out of Tacoma, Wash. He performs regularly in orchestras, concert bands, choral ensembles, and ballet orchestras around the region; and recent appearances as a soloist include performances with Northwest Sinfonietta, Rainier Symphony, the Tacoma Community College Wind Ensemble, the Southwest Washington Wind Symphony, and the Lake Chelan Bach Festival.

As an educator and conductor, Lund has worked with youth orchestra organizations around the state for more than 15 years, including as the

music director for the Capital Youth Symphony and the Federal Way Youth Symphony Orchestra. Currently, Lund is the music director and conductor of the Rainier Symphony in Tukwila, Wash. His international conducting experience includes tours of South Korea, and televised appearances on the Korean CTS network. To date, he is the only American conductor to have been invited to conduct an orchestra on the Liancourt Rocks in the Sea of Japan. This June, Lund is planning to make his European conducting debut in Berlin, Germany.

Lund is the affiliate artist in percussion at the University of Puget Sound and is a faculty member at Tacoma Community College.

ANDREW SPENCER has had a 40-year career as an active recitalist, performing as a soloist in the United States, Poland, Japan, Canada, and Costa Rica. In 1999, he released "Slender Beams," a recording, which features works by composer Dave Hollinden. In addition, Spencer has premiered numerous compositions, including works by Hollinden, Jay Batzner, Mike McFerron, Mark Polishook, Samuel Adler, Robert May, and Henry Gwiazda.

Equally experienced in orchestral performance Spencer was principal timpanist with the Lansing and West Michigan Symphony Orchestras. He was timpanist/principal percussionist with the Yakima Symphony Orchestra, and principal percussionist for the Cascade Festival Orchestra before moving to Michigan. Additional positions have included principal percussionist/timpanist with the Fargo- Moorhead Symphony Orchestra and Fargo-Moorhead Civic Opera Company. He has performed with the Spokane Symphony, the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, and the Lake Forest Symphony Orchestra. Spencer has also performed with numerous chamber ensembles throughout the Pacific Northwest, Chicago, New York, and the upper Midwest, and played drumset with the Central Michigan University Jazz Faculty Ensemble.
